Facts about Cicadas by Matin

Some cicada species live as long as 17 years, although most of that time is spent underground.

Cicadas have a special organ called a tymbal. The tymbal has a series of ribs that buckle one after the other when the cicada shows its muscles. Every time a rib buckles, the rib makes a CLICK!

That is the noise we can hear.

The young citadas are called nymphs. They stay underground for two to 17 years. When they are ready, they emerge above ground atsunset, climb the trunk of a nearby tree and shed their skin. Now they're adult cicadas.
